Medical Child Abuse

- Literature Review about medical child abuse and social work practice
- Commissioned Allen&Clarke to do the review for us
- Focused on 2010 on, but included research from before that if it seemed significant
- Searched for International and Aotearoa research





The literature review purpose

Multiple intended uses:

- to learn of current understanding of the topic
- to share with kaimahi, particularly social workers
- to inform professional practice responses to requests for assistance when Oranga Tamariki has kaimahi working with families or whānau where medical child abuse may be present
- to inform future policy and practice work.





The literature review

- Focus on harm to children
- Search terms included:
- Medical Child Abuse
- Factitious Disorder Imposed on Another (FDIA)
- Munchausen syndrome by proxy
- Fabricated or induced illness
- Malingering by proxy
- 44 journal articles or reports were used
- Key gaps in the literature were identified, including no information directly relevant to whānau Māori affected by child medical abuse or FDIA





IN-CONFIDENCE

What I learnt

- Reports of Child Medical Abuse are rare in NZ and internationally
- It is probably under-reported
- Identification can be difficult
- The consequences are often severe and long-lasting for the child experiencing the harm and often for the wider family
- The person imposing the harm is most often the mother
- Social work focus is on the safety of the child
